A Message from Laura

Exam Season

It's summer time. For a whole swath of families that means the school year is nearly over, the exams are over and the results are



coming in. I used to be a teacher and, as part of my job, I taught GCSE and A Level pupils. I would talk to the students about how they needed to work harder and understand that the work they were doing now as 15, 16, 17, 18 year old pupils affected the rest of their life. I could see they were entirely with me, nodding along.

Then I would realise what I was saying was unhelpful, and say, "Most of this is total rubbish. If you fail every exam tomorrow, it's not the end of the world." They got so confused: "What do you mean?" they would say. What did I mean? Well, I wanted them to pass the exams, because I wanted them to do the best they could. I wanted them to have every possible option available to them. I wrote references for pupils who had able and imaginative minds. We all know children who are strikingly, or extraordinarily bright, and they don't all get the opportunity they deserve.

I tried to give children who were on the verge of the magical C grade extra help, because I wanted them to do the best they could and I believed a C grade mattered. I had been brought up in an education system where I was asked if I wanted to do well in life, I was told the answer to that question began with GCSE and A Level grades: A B C D E. I don't recall anyone ever asking us how we felt, how we were coping or what we thought mattered.

Instead of asking about GCSE results, maybe we should ask: how can we help you reach the goals you want to reach? Instead of measuring academic achievements, we could ask, "Who have you helped, this week or this month?'

It's exam season and a lovely time to celebrate achievement, but there are other skills and pathways that are less celebrated and equally exciting. One interesting aspect of our two villages is the number of different schools and education pathways all the young people find. It is lovely to see the Year six children in Huxley school go on to new and exciting pathways. May God be with all those in their exam season and their transitions to new settings, and remember, God doesn't care about exam results, God just cares about you.

Huxley C.E. Primary School June 2022

Well I can't quite believe that we have nearly finished a whole year at Huxley. What a rollercoaster of a year it has been but what a wonderful one for our children. The



progress that these children have made has been amazing and for many, this was their first year in education which should be celebrated. Our school was inspected last term as many of you know and without going into too much detail, the school has areas for improvement. We were already very aware of these improvements and know what needs to be done to achieve these. We were unfortunate to be inspected when we were, as it was very early into our new approach. To give you some context we have 89% flexischooled children who come to us on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday and they are home educated on a Monday and Friday. The majority of our children have never been to school before either.

We are pleased to say that we had 29 children when Ofsted arrived but we now have 36 children on roll, so we have gained another 7 children this term with two more possibly joining us before the end of summerso numbers are looking great. Our current parents have been amazingly supportive and know how hard we are working to ensure the very best for our pupils. Huxley is an extremely unique school and I am incredibly proud to be head teacher here. Our staff are devoted to ensuring that our children feel safe, happy and cared for. It is in my opinion that all children need these prerequisites to learning and only when they feel their needs are being met socially and emotionally, are they ready to learn. And our children are, ready to learn and eager to do so. The 'feel' of the school is truly magical and everyone who visits our school all echo this. I endeavour to make this school successful and to put Huxley CE on the map!

Last week we had our school onsite residential which was fantastic. The children took part in a variety of activities such as archery, laser tag, climbing wall and many team challenges like gutterball, nightline and crepe challenge. The children were so fantastically behaved, a real credit to their parents/guardians. We didn't hear a peep out of them at night time- which is more than we can say about the local peacocks that amusingly kept the staff awake!

This week we have had our family afternoon which consisted of sports day, an interactive duck race, family rounders, maypole dancing and the first of many Huxley Egg Throwing competitions. A fantastic day was had by all!

In the next few weeks we have many events leading up to our current year 6 leaving. We have 8 children leaving us this time, some returning to home education and some moving on to high school- we wish them all the very best and congratulate them on a superb year at Huxley. We are incredibly proud of them. In September we welcome six new children in reception and two more children in our Acorns and Oaks class.

So exciting times ahead...

The Duke of York

Frederick Duke of York, was the second son of King George III, and a very capable military officer. His Army reforms stamped out corrupt dealing in appointments and promotions, improved recruiting, instituted regular training for officers and men, and led to the establishment of the Royal Military College in 1801, and subsequently



to Sandhurst and the Staff College. All of this hugely improved the quality of the armies led by Wellington against Bonaparte, and indeed of the British Army to this day.

However, he was obliged to resign in 1809 over a scandal involving his mistress, Mrs. Clarke. Of course, a scandal like that could never happen today.....

In our university days, Bill Ind and I were in hall together. He was a reader, follower and player of cricket, whilst I got my fun from riding horses. Bill bowled in a match whilst Bishop of Grantham, and in a bishops match at the 1998 Lambeth Conference, where he had the benefit of two generous LBW decisions by Archbishop Robert Runcie.

Called upon to speak after a cricketing dinner, after Ted Dexter, Bill said he'd had an audience with the Pope, lunch with the Queen, lectured at Oxford and Cambridge, and preached in several cathedrals, and continued, 'Lord now lettest Thou thy servant depart in peace, for mine eyes have seen Ted Dexter and Hubert Doggart.'

Bill, (from Cheltenham), was particularly interested in a left hand batsman, who played with some distinction for Gloucestershire, and was selected for England a few times in the late 1940s. The man's name was Jack Crapp.

Bill went on to retire as Bishop of Truro, and liked to recall the 1948/9 South Africa series when Denis Compton and Jack won the game and series for England, noting a particularly unfortunate headline in a West Country newspaper which read, "All Englishmen take their hats off to Crapp".

Please don't blame me for that – the Bishop made me do it.
